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
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
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
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## Perfect pancake

Draw around the dotted line to create your own perfect pancake, then color it in.






## Rainbows in Bloom comes to life!

  Bonus activity: grab paper and glue and use your flower cutouts to design your own garden!






## FRIGHTENING FEASTS


## **MONSTROUS MASKS**

Then, you can cut it out and wear it for the ultimate spooky costume!






#### What a Shell Can Tell

Design your own shell pattern!

A mollusk licks over its shell edge, 'drawing' patterns as it makes its shell bigger. Design your own shell patterns that stand out from the crowd. You could draw stripes or triangles, zigzags or spots, scribbles or squiggles!



It's a mystery why mollusks draw patterns on their shells! Scientists think mollusks might write messages to remind themselves of where they need to add more layers to their hard shells so that they don't grow all wonky and out of shape.

Why not write a secret message in your pattern?

#### Be a Shell **Detective**

You can tell a lot about a shell from looking at it. On your next walk or trip to the beach, take a closer look at the shells you find. With these clues, what can you discover?



#### SHAPE

Look at its shape. What type of shell is it?




If a shell comes in two parts that fit together then it's a bivalve, meaning 'two doors'.



If it has a spiralling shape then it's a gastropod, which means 'stomach foot'.


#### AGE

How old is your shell?




#### **TEXTURE**

Run your fingers over it. Is it rough or smooth or bumpy?



Some shells have rings or ridges that you can see or feel. Count the dark rings to tell how old it is.



Bumpy and rough shells help seaweed and sponges grow to hide them from predators. Smooth shells can help snails dig into sand quickly.

What else do you notice about your shell?


#### **FRIDA KAHLO**


## If I had...

HINT: I was covered in spikes from head to tail.


My tail spikes were sharp enough to pierce through armor.


#### **Fewest Teeth**

HINT: I was born with a full mouth of sharp teeth. But I lost them as a teenager and grew a beak. So long, chompers!











## INSTRUCTIONS



1. Trace around the hands of each member of your family on card and cut them out. These will be your hand templates. Trace each of the templates twice onto different coloured felts, then




2. To make the eye clouds, cut out two larger cloud shapes, and eight additional circles. For the larger circles cut out two circles that fit into the cloud, and six additional smaller circles for the inside of the eye.



- 3. Cut the string into 4-5 pieces, each between 6-12 in long. Glue one end of a piece of string to a coin and then glue the coin onto the middle of a cloud or hand template and tape over it. Then glue a matching felt cloud or hand cutout onto the card, over the coin and string. Paste the other matching felt cloud or hand onto the other side of the card, so both sides are covered
- in felt. Complete the cloud by glueing eye parts on both sides.

  4. Add a few other card templates (hands or clouds) onto your




5. Tie a fresh piece of string to the middle of your branch.



This is the string from which your mobile will hang.

Lay your branch on the floor and arrange the decorated



strings along the branch. Try to balance out the weight so that when you hang the mobile, one side isn't heavier than the other. Tie the strings tightly to the branch. Now it's ready to be hung!
